

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT COVID-19 VACCINES



Vaccines are critical tools for protecting our health and preventing the spread of COVID-19. More than 70% of all Kitsap residents have already been vaccinated. Thank you for sharing reliable information!

How do vaccines help?

- Getting vaccinated will help prevent you from getting sick from COVID-19 and protect you from becoming severely ill or dying if you do get sick.
- Getting vaccinated will make it safer to visit friends and family and protect you at your work or school.
- If enough people get vaccinated and continue taking precautions, we can reduce the spread of COVID-19 and keep our community on the path to recovery.

Who can get vaccinated?

- COVID-19 vaccination is recommended for everyone ages 5 and older.
- Vaccination is available at no cost. Health insurance is not required.
- Vaccination is available regardless of citizenship or immigration status.

What COVID-19 vaccines are available?

Three COVID-19 vaccines are available in the United States. The Food and Drug Administration has fully approved the Pfizer vaccine. The Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines are available under Emergency Use Authorization.

^{*}A special pediatric Pfizer dose is recommended for children ages 5-11.

After you are fully vaccinated (two doses of Pfizer or Moderna, or one dose of Johnson & Johnson), it will take about two weeks for your body to build up protection against COVID-19.

What is an Emergency Use Authorization?

An Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) is a designation used to ensure medical tools such as vaccines can be made available quickly and safely during an emergency.

COVID-19 vaccines were rigorously tested in clinical trials prior to being granted EUA and recommended for use. No safety steps were skipped. Learn more at **fda.gov**

What are the side effects?

- Most people experience mild side effects after vaccination, such as a sore arm, tiredness, muscle ache, headache, chills, or fever.
- Severe reactions are rare, but can occur.
- **Talk to your doctor** if you have questions about your health and getting a COVID-19 vaccine.

How do I get vaccinated?

- Minors younger than 18 need consent from a parent or guardian to get vaccinated.
